

Parent and Staff Program for Symptom Recognition and Disability Stigma Reduction

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Description of Buonora Child Development Centers

- Provides early intervention services to children and their families
 - Center-based classes, occupational therapy (OT), physical therapy, speech, child development
 - 93% Spanish-speaking population
- Mission: Honoring every child's current stage in their development and gently guiding them forward. Aiming to educate children holistically to promote growth and development (Buonora Centers, 2025)

Summary of Needs Assessment

- Parent education on symptom recognition and management
- Staff training on early detection of developmental delays and strategies to support development
- Digital binder of educational resources for both parents and staff to promote development and reduce stigma surrounding disabilities

Literature Review

- Disparities in Diagnosis and Treatment (Angell et al., 2018, Gallegos et al., 2021)
 - Developmental disabilities are often underdiagnosed or misdiagnosed
- The Importance of Education Toward Equitable Care (Aylward et al., 2021; Kiing et al., 2019)
 - Community-level education can increase awareness of early signs of delays and reduce disparities
- Effectiveness of Sensory-Rich Early Intervention (Blanche et al., 2016; Oh et al., 2024)
 - Sensory integration interventions are proven to be effective in improving developmental skills

Project Objectives

- Develop and implement a program to improve parent knowledge and selfefficacy and reduce stigma surrounding disability
- Develop and implement a program to train staff on early detection of delays and strategies to support development early
- Create a digital binder of educational resources to distribute to parents and staff to reinforce their role in supporting the children

Project Description and Implementation

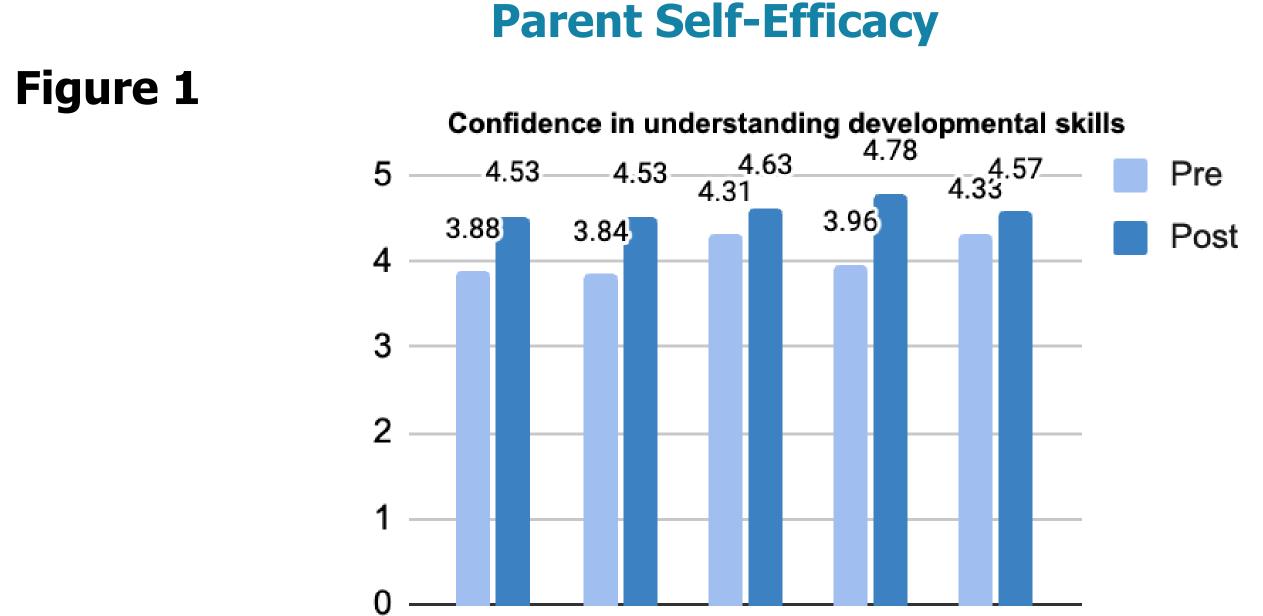
Parent & Staff Workshops

- Developed and implemented an educational program for parents and staff in early intervention settings
 - **Purpose:**
 - Increase awareness of OT services
 - Educate on early symptom recognition of developmental delays
 - Provide OT strategies to manage symptoms
 - Reduce stigma surrounding disability
 - Provide educational resources
 - Participants: 55 parents and 22 staff

Structure:

- 13 parent and six staff workshops
- Workshops delivered in-person for parents and via Zoom for staff
- Parent workshops delivered in English and Spanish
- One hour sessions
- Six topics: Introduction to OT, Cognitive Skills, Motor Skills, Language Skills, Adaptive Behavior Skills, and Socio-emotional Skills

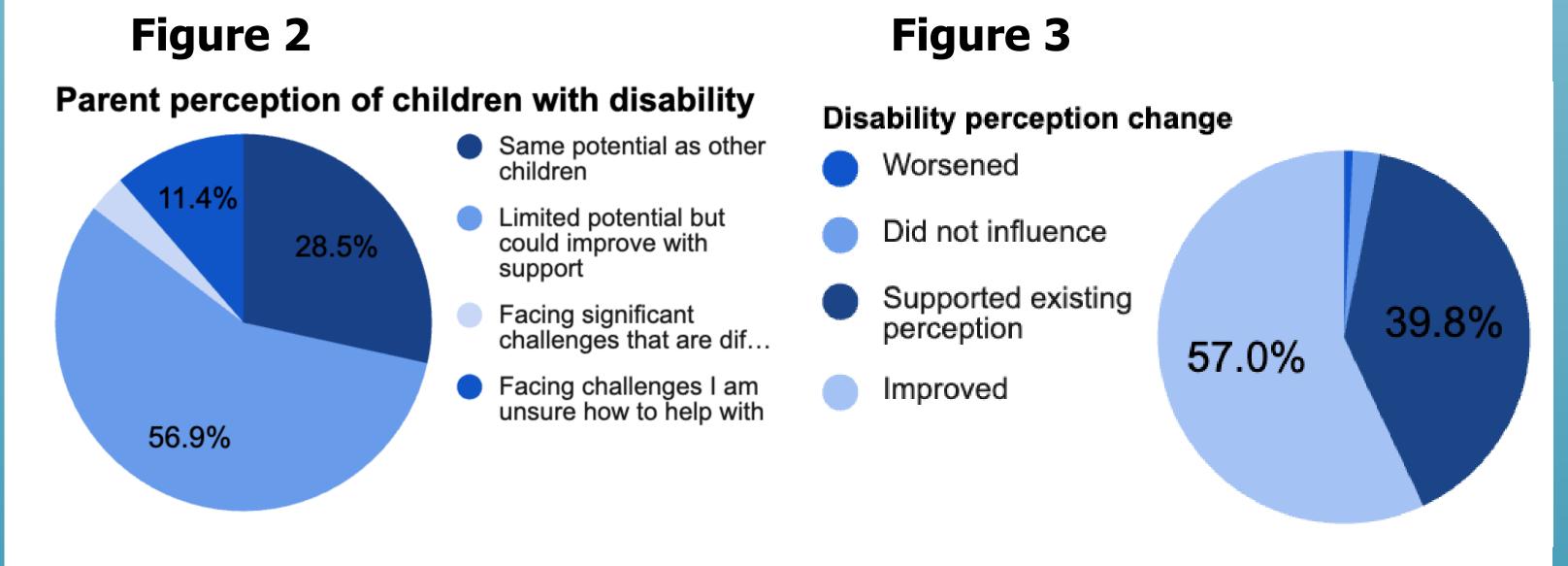
Evaluation & Outcomes



Note: Legend for figure 1 and 4: A = cognitive, B = motor, C = language, D = adaptive behavior, E = socio-emotional

- Increased confidence in understanding developmental skills (p<0.001)
- "Parents started showing up on time, using their phones less, asking more questions, and applying the strategies"

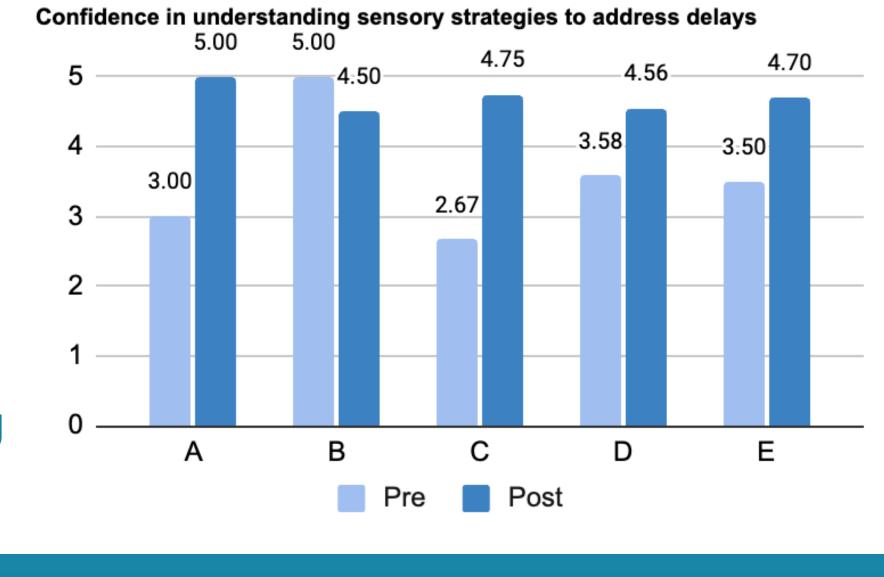
Parent Attitudes Towards Disability and Developmental Delays



Staff Outcomes

Statistically significant improvements (p<0.001):

- Knowledge of OT roles and services
- Understanding and using sensory strategies
- Classroom implementation confidence
- Identifying delays and sharing resources



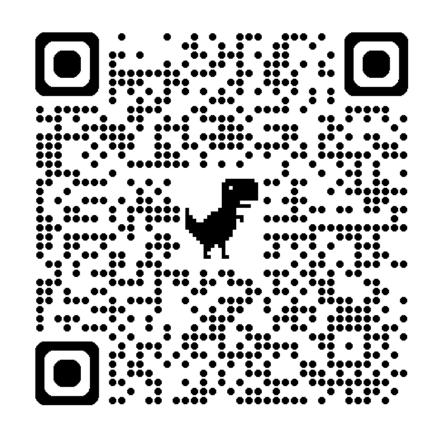
